#### Exercise 1

We use <b>much</b> + uncountable noun: <b>much food</b> / <b>much money</b> etc.:	We use many + plural noun: many books / many people etc.:
<ul> <li>Did you buy much food?</li> <li>We haven't got much luggage.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Did you buy many books?</li> <li>We don't know many people.</li> </ul>
How much money do you want?	• How many photographs did you take?
<ul> <li>A: Have you got any money?</li> <li>B: I've got some but not much.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>A: Did you take any photographs?</li> <li>B: I took some but not many.</li> </ul>
We use <b>a lot of</b> + all types of noun:	
• We bought a lot of food.	We bought a lot of books.
<ul> <li>Paula hasn't got a lot of free time.</li> </ul>	Did they ask you a lot of questions?
Note that we say:	
<ul> <li>There is a lot of food/money/water (singular verb)</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>There are a lot of trees/shops/people (plural verb)</li> </ul>
	A lot of people speak English. (not 'speaks')

#### How much ... ?

Use with uncountables. How much homework have you got? How much time have we got? How much milk do you want? Not m

#### How many ... ?

Use with countables. How many pages do you have to read? How many brothers and sisters have you got? How many people are there here? How many players are there?

Lots! We've got fifteen minutes. Not much.

> Ten. Two brothers. A hundred. Not very **many**.
