

Lesson 11-Recap-Grammar (part2)



Exercise 1

<p>We use much + <i>uncountable noun</i>: much food / much money etc.:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Did you buy much food?• We haven't got much luggage.• How much money do you want?• A: Have you got any money? B: I've got some but not much.	<p>We use many + <i>plural noun</i>: many books / many people etc.:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Did you buy many books?• We don't know many people.• How many photographs did you take?• A: Did you take any photographs? B: I took some but not many.
<p>We use a lot of + <i>all types of noun</i>:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• We bought a lot of food.• Paula hasn't got a lot of free time. <p>Note that we say:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• There is a lot of food/money/water ... (<i>singular verb</i>)	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• We bought a lot of books.• Did they ask you a lot of questions? <ul style="list-style-type: none">• There are a lot of trees/shops/people ... (<i>plural verb</i>)• A lot of people speak English. (<i>not 'speaks'</i>)

How much ... ?

Use with uncountables.

How much homework have you got?	<i>Lots!</i>
How much time have we got?	<i>We've got fifteen minutes.</i>
How much milk do you want?	<i>Not much.</i>

How many ... ?

Use with countables.

How many pages do you have to read?	<i>Ten.</i>
How many brothers and sisters have you got?	<i>Two brothers.</i>
How many people are there here?	<i>A hundred.</i>
How many players are there?	<i>Not very many.</i>

 <p>a little water</p> <p>(a) little + <i>uncountable noun</i>:</p> <p>(a) little water (a) little money (a) little time (a) little soup</p>	 <p>a few books</p> <p>(a) few + <i>plural noun</i>:</p> <p>(a) few books (a) few questions (a) few people (a) few days</p>
<p>a little = some but not much:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • She didn't eat anything but she drank a little water. • I speak a little Spanish. (= some Spanish but not much) • A: Can you speak Spanish? B: A little. 	<p>a few = some but not many:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Last night I wrote a few letters. • We're going away for a few days. • I speak a few words of Spanish. • A: Are there any shops in the village? B: Yes, a few.
<p>a little (<i>without a</i>) = nearly no ... or nearly nothing:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There was little food in the fridge. It was nearly empty. <p>You can say very little:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Dan is very thin because he eats very little. (= nearly nothing) 	<p>a few (<i>without a</i>) = nearly no ... :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There were few people in the park. It was nearly empty. <p>You can say very few:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Your English is very correct. You make very few mistakes.
