- Used with countable nouns.

Used with **Example**

Many

- We don't have many things to do today.
- How many siblings do you have?

Meaning

A large amount of something.

Affirmative statements, offers, requests and in questions when you expect the answer.

Used with **Example**

Some

We've got some oranges.

Meaning

An amount of or a number of.

Negative statements, questions.

Used with **Example**

Any

- Have you got any bananas?
No I haven't got any.

Meaning

An amount of or a number of.

- Before adjectives and adverbs.
- Before countable nouns and uncountable nouns with the expressions "too much" and "too many".

Used with **Example**

Too

- It's too late to stop him.
- There is too much sugar in this coffee.

Meaning

More/Less than sufficient/necessary.

- Comes after adjectives and adverbs.
- Comes before nouns.

Used with **Example**

Enough

- Your clothes are big enough to fit me.
- You've done enough work. You can stop now.
